Project Background

The Municipality of Anchorage (MOA) Project Management and Engineering Division (PM&E) is working on the **9th Avenue Reconstruction Project from L Street to LaTouche Street**.

The project was divided into two segments with the first phase, **9th Avenue - L Street to Cordova Street**, mostly completed in 2010. Construction between A Street and C Street started on Monday, May 23rd and we anticipate completing this final portion of Phase I by the end of June 2011.

The design for Phase II, **9th Avenue - Cordova Street to Latouche Street**, is currently being finalized. The Phase II project is anticipated to bid in 2011 and to start construction in 2012.

CONSTRUCTION FACT.....

Note that it is normal to observe pauses in the construction work. New concrete, for example, requires 3 to 5 days to "cure" before adjacent work can occur to prevent damaging the concrete.



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
